Course Syllabus - CNST 2345 Construction Documents for Capital Projects

Course Description:

This course introduces students to the construction documents commonly used in Industrial construction projects. It also focuses on the understanding of the hierarchy/relationships among those documents.

Course Prerequisites:

C or better in CNST 2325.

Textbook:

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon the completion of the course students will demonstrate the ability to:

- 1. Understand and compare aspects of different project delivery methods
- 2. Understand the various stakeholders involved and their roles in the different project delivery methods
- 3. Understand how to read construction documents and associated nomenclature
- 4. Understand the organization of information in construction documents
- 5. Extract information to perform various construction management tasks
- 6. Understand what contracts are and how they are used in the construction industry
- 7. Know common legal issues which arise in different phases of a construction project
- 8. Understand strategies for avoiding and/or resolving construction disputes

In addition to the learning objectives above, this course emphasizes Ethics, Safety, and Oral/Written Communication.

Academic Honesty:

The instructor places all grades into the hands of the student, and the final grade is based on the performance of the student participation, journal/case studies, project, quizzes, and final examinations and the class project. Attendance and participation are the responsibility of the student. Graded work assignments submitted after the stated submission date and time shall be reduced in possible grade by 20%. The student is responsible for all reading assignments and class handouts whether or not covered in class.

The last day of class is the deadline for students to verify their grades and the accuracy of their score. After this deadline, there will be no consideration for any changes.

Daily Report (Project Journal)/Case Studies:

Each student is to maintain a journal using a three-ring binder. At each class meeting the student is to enter the following information into the journal on a new page using the daily log format provided:

- Name
- Date & Report Number (Session Number)
- Weather HSE Topic discussed
- Daily Report (Class notes)

Case Studies/Reading Assignments to be posted on Blackboard and will be completed on the daily log form. Late submission of assignments will be accepted but will incur a 10% penalty per week. Hard copies of the assignments will also be added to the Journal.

• After the final exam, the teacher will look at the journals via Microsoft Teams and provide comments. You will be graded on the completeness and neatness of your journal including printing and note taking abilities.

HSE Topics:

Each class will begin with an HSE topic. Topics will be assigned during the first class. Volunteers who choose to present a topic will receive 20 points of extra credit. Topics should be presented using PowerPoint Slides (2-3) and should not be read from the slides. The HSE topic should also include a current weather report.

Quizzes:

Multiple choice and True/False Quizzes will be given during the semester by hard copy. ALL QUIZZES WILL BE in Blackboard. Check Announcements for Quizzes announced during or after Class. One Quiz will involve a Case Study (analysis of a partial actual contract) and then answering analysis questions from that contract.

Final Exam:

The final exam will be comprehensive multiple choice/true/false and will be administered through blackboard. Questions will be from lectures, modules, HSE topics, reading assignments, and articles posted. You will be allowed to reference your Journal during the exams.

Phones and other Electronic Devices

Phones and other Electronic Devices are not to be heard. Make sure you silence these devices during class. Any device that emits noise during class is a distraction and is inappropriate for the classroom. Talking / texting on your phone during class is not allowed. It is not considerate to your fellow classmates who have paid for the course. All electronic devices must be turned off and out of sight during exams and quizzes. Students may be asked to leave for the day if this behavior persists. Academic evaluations during classes missed under these criteria will be counted as zero.
